PRESENT: 52 people were present on Zoom when the AVM came to order.

2. FINANCE & STRAT PLAN COMMITTEE

2.1 Stewardship & Finance Committee Reports, 2020 YE Financial Statements + 2021 Budget & Strat Plan 28 Plans

The 14 pages of Finance & Strat Plan Committee material was presented in six sections (pages 5-9 and 16-24 of the Vestry package). The six sections were; Stewardship Report, F&SPC Report, Balance Sheet, Income Statement, 2021 Budget, and Strat Plan 2021 Closing Report.

These 14 pages/six sections/reports were MSC'd as Motion 2.1 by the Finance Committee & Rose Toyoken.

Redevelopment: One of the most important aspect of the 14 pages was the introduction of Redevelopment as Smart Goal #15 of the new 2028 Strat Plan, with a Balance Sheet allotment of \$22,000, following a meeting with the Diocese on 17 December 2020, and their encouragement to proceed.

2021 Deficit: The second critical aspect of the F&SPC reports was the projection of a substantial deficit in 2021, SMM's first deficit since 2006. While giving's are projected to be down, the biggest impact was the dramatic decline in rents. Our Balance Sheet has equipped SMM to deal with this 2021 loss without undue financial hardships to the mission or future of our church.

2021 Strat Plan Closing Report:

The 7-year Strat Plan 2021 Project was officially closed with ratification of the 10 page report on pages 16 through 24. Ratification included activation of the new 7-year Strat Plan 2028, with its particular emphasis on redevelopment. The map following of the Broadway Corridor Sky-train gives a sense for the proximity of SMM to 2 Stations. The in-service timeframe of 2025 gives a sense for the timeframes of our Redevelopment Project – be ready for the challenges ahead, remembering that there is no hurry.

3. REPORTS - Verbal & Written


11 reports were presented, some with associated Motions, some written, some verbal, as follows (in order of presentation): The Rev. Wilmer Toyoken & the Rev. Eric Stroo (Minister's Report), Brigette Castro (Meal Ministry), Terry Cutforth (Buildings, verbal), Rose Toyoken (Kids & Youth Ministry), Padi (EAM/ACAM), Judith Carling (ACW), Ramon Bosaing (MBSM), Brigitte Laweng (Choir, verbal), and Moses (Day Care, verbal) [Stewardship by Sandra Baldo, Balance Sheet by Pilong Bosaing, and Income Statement by James Baldo were presented as part of Section 2 above].

3.1 MINISTER'S REPORT - Wilmer & Eric

Padi's overall report can be seen on page 10 of 24, Eric's report on page 11 of 24, and the Evening Prayer Survey results on page 12 of 24. Also, Padi introduced the following motion: *Motion 3.1 MSC'd by Padi & James, that "per the list/letter presented to the AVM, Vestry ratify these 18 members of the congregation as Lay Administrators for SMM for 2021."*

3.3 MEAL MINISTRY - BRIGETTE

Page 13 of 24, for forwarding to St. Philip's, summarized the Meal Ministry November Survey. Brigette covered three essential points arising; BUDGETING (down in 2021), JUST RIGHT (the number of Meal Ministry Events), and RE-OPENING (contingent on Dr Henry).





3.4 BUILDING & RENTAL REPORT - TERRY

Terry has continued to work throughout the year, despite the pandemic. A big job was achieved with BC Hydro when power was lost to the building, with the costs borne by Hydro. The \$6,000 Blake bequest last Vestry allowed Terry to add aesthetic cladding outside the Guild Room, along with painting the Hall & re-doing the Guild Room stairs. An 8 camera security system was also installed around and in the Church and Day Care.

3.5 YOUTH - ROSE

The Kids & Youth Report can be seen on page 14 of 24. During her report, Rose emphasized in particular youth participation in the Anglican Communion EAM/ACAM Zoom meetings starting in September, as well as a big thanks to Uncle Sam (Copley) and the beginning of his 20-year annual bequest of \$5,000 to the Kids & Youth, beginning in 2020. "God is with us" - Rose closed with an affirming message from Deuteronomy 31:6.

3.6 EAM/ACAM - Padi

As with many travel activities in 2020, SMM Sponsorship of an EAM/ACAM youth camp at Camp Artaban was cancelled.

3.7 ACW - Judith.

Despite being cancelled because of COVID, the ACW had been honored in being selected to host the 2020 Diocesan ACW meeting. Judith was also honored for her leadership by being asked to join the Diocesan ACW leadership team. See the full report on page 14 of 24.

3.8 MBSM - Ramon

Vice President Ramon Bosaing reviewed the MBSM report (page 14 of 24). Of particular note was the fund raising in 2020, nearly doubling the amount the MBSM has reserved on the Balance Sheet (see line 2540 on page 8 of 24).

3.9 CHOIR - Brigitte

Brigitte thanks all the Zoom volunteer singers, especially Eijun, the youngest singer ... and would be happy if others would like to volunteer to add to the diversity.

3.10 Day Care - Moses

As with the Church, the Day Care has been closed since March of 2020, and continues to be in a state of limbo.

With the 11 reports done, the Chair sought the following motion: MSC'd by the Rev Eric Stroo and Terry Cutforth that the eleven spoken and written 2021 AVM reports (agenda items 3.1 through 3.10, pages 10 through 14) be accepted as read/presented.

4. 2022 ODNW Nomination - James

Biennial ODNW nominations occur next at the 2022 Vestry. The 2020 awards went to Danilla and Pilong, as pictured below:

5. **ELECTION of OFFICERS - JAMES**

James and his Nominating Committee continued the approach begun in 2012, adhering to the five Constitutional paragraphs pertaining to multiculturalism, and the three traditions (read out by James at Vestry). In developing the ballot and the candidates, James Baldo, as Chair of the Committee, ensured these eight criteria were abided by.

- Per the Constitutional Update ratified in 2018, the two additional Trustee positions continue to be included on the ballot, being mindful that this 'growth' in Trustee positions came about upon examining seven equivalent Diocesan churches on the CRA web-site, where it was found that most of them had at least 8 Trustees.
- With no nominations from the floor, MSC'd by Eric & Sandra that nominations be closed, with the ballot (page 15 of 24) MSC'd by James & Janette as a slate.



• The results of the election are reflected in the Team of Teams graphic on page 22 of 24, with its emphasis on 'Establishing Authority' (the figure is known affectionately as Cyril's Donut!).

On Super Bowl Sunday, the Chair brought us in 30 minutes early. A productive fast paced Zoom Vestry MSC closed by Brigette and Ramon, followed by a virtual Grace. *Soli Deo Gloria*.

NOTE: Prior to final circulation and posting, the minutes, or their portion of the minutes, were reviewed/approved by the Presenters.

As has been the long standing tradition at St. Mike's, at the first Church Committee meeting after Vestry [21 March 2021], these minutes are read seriatim and provisionally accepted, ensuring they are reviewed in detail while the AVM is still fresh in everyone's minds.



ANNUAL REPORT 2.2 - FINANCE/STRAT PLAN 28 COMMITTEE - 2021 TO 2028

The Finance Committee (FC) hereby presents SMM's 2021 Financial Statements and Reports (p-8 & p-9), with particular emphasis on the 7 years of the 2021 Strat Plan (2014-2021) and the 7 years in the black over the life of that Plan.

- I. It is especially significant that during the two COVID years (2020 & '21) SMM was in the black.
- II. In order of priority, 3 groups helped SMM achieve the miracle of avoiding deficits in '20 & '21 were:
 - 1) PAD Givings PAD exceeded \$50,000 in 2021, exceeding 2019 givings both years.
 - 2) Diocesan Support Diocesan COVID support reduced wages & assessments both years.
 - 3) **Federal Support** Federal support reduced wages considerably in 2021.
- III. The fourth factor in the miracle of avoiding a deficit in 2020 & '21 was the Finance Committee both years they managed down expenses by over \$50,000, balancing out revenue losses.
- IV. The 2 factors above (II & III) also ensured that SMM did not need to touch their strategic reserve.
- V. For 2022, given the absence of '1.3', and a reduction in 'II.2', we are predicting a deficit in 2022. This will be the first deficit since 2006, potentially ending 15 years of modest surpluses.

ANNUAL REPORT 3.1.1 - MINISTER'S REPORT

The best way to describe SMM for the year 2021 is we are in good hands. The distressing effect of this unrelented Covid 19 forces some business establishments and organizations to close, while others are continually struggling to cope up. Thanks be to God, that amidst these challenges, SMM is strong and persevering. We were able to find ways of keeping the church to her commitment. With your unwavering support and generosity, and the support of the Diocese SMM is in good hands. I pray and hope that this year 2022 with God's help we will still be in good hands. Here are the highlights of accomplishment for year 2021.

1. PAROCHIAL STATISTICS

- ➤ Sunday Services From virtual Sunday Services in 2020 we were able to do Hybrid Sunday Services (on line and on site). Our regular Sunday attendance on line is ranging from 30-40 families while on site is 7-20 persons. Through five Hybrid Services, we've done the following: 1. Sea Sunday Celebration with Rev. Peter; 2. Farewell Celebration for Rev. Eric Final Sunday; 3. 132nd SMM Anniversary Celebration w/ AB Melissa and Deacon Eric; 4. Hosted the Diocesan ACW Fall gathering; and, 5. Conducted six Baptisms.
- ➤ Weekday Services Evening Prayer every Tuesday and Thursday stands out as our number one regular week day service. For year 2021, we were able to have 99 EP services all done virtually with a short homily from Greg and Padi Wilmer. The attendance every service is ranging from 7-12 individuals. Other weekday services were also done such as: Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, Celebrations of Life and Baptisms.
- ➤ Parish Membership Our Parish Membership data for year 2021 slightly change due to baptism, death and moving to other places. Below are the 4-year comparisons of Parish membership.

- > God is good to SMM. As Deacon Eric ended his term, we were blessed to have Bishop Alexander Wandag join us here at SMM. He is a retired ECP Bishop in the Philippines, joining Grace and some of their children here in Canada. He is now a licensed preacher in the Diocese, and an Honorary associate clergy here at SMM. Thank you, Bishop Alex, for accepting our request to become part SMM clergy and congregation.

3. PASTORAL MINISTRY

For year 2021, we were able to visit our parishioners who are in need. Donald and Sam who are at the same care home were visited. We visited hospitals not only for our sick parishioners but also for others who have been referred to us. We have done memorial services and also continue providing food for the needy and hungry through our Food Bank program.

4. EVENTS PARTICIPATED

- ➤ Covid 19 limit our in person gathering and church activities. Yet, even though few in numbers, SMM was able to help in packing Christmas gifts for seafarers at the Mission to Seafarers office. For 2021, the use of technologies defies the limitation brought by Covid 19. There are no limitations of gathering or having a meeting or a webinar if done virtually. Here at SMM, we've done a lot through the use of Zoom.
 - ✓ We participated in the Virtual Retirement Celebration for AB Melissa. SMM presented an indigenous dance.
 - ✓ We joined the Webinar for Stewardship 365 for six weeks hosted by the Diocese.
 - ✓ We joined the Diocesan Trustees and Wardens Virtual Seminar
 - ✓ We joined the EAM Webinar on Church Planting on Church Planting in the Asian Diaspora.
 - ✓ Most of our church committee meetings were done virtually.
 - ✓ The ACAM meetings were also done virtually.
 - ✓ Hosted virtual meetings of the Deanery Clergy.

ANNUAL REPORT 3.1.2 - DEACON'S REPORT

For this deacon, 2021 was a year of much frustration. On New Year's Day, 2021, my wife, aka the Archbishop, crossed back to Canada from a brief holiday in the US to resume work and to quarantine in preparation for some in-person activities. Nine weeks later, she retired from her role in the diocese and drove back to Washington with Teddy the terrier to sort out next steps. I had no real part in helping with the move, of course, because I was restricted from crossing the border. These Covid restrictions had been in place for a full year by that point.

The border closure also meant that I could not participate in person with the St. Michael's congregation, but that fact was overshadowed by the reality that in-person gatherings were largely disallowed. So church services became virtual affairs, and I managed to hold on to my "seat" in the Sunday worship services at St. Michael's.

Although my presence in the gatherings was only virtual, it meant that my attendance rate was a bit better than it had been in past years! I felt blessed to continue having a steady part to play, and the church connection served as a rudder in the confusing, choppy seas of this pandemic time. Our brief Sunday morning conversations helped to keep me on course, and I am grateful to have heard from a wide slice of people in the church community. It was a tremendous source of friendship and encouragement for me in a difficult time.

With the border closed, I could not make my visits to the ships in the harbour in the last year, which did greatly limit my sense of diaconal ministry. I missed shipboard crews and the regular exchanges with Port Chaplain Peter Smyth. I was gratified to know that others in the congregation took steps to maintain our partner relationship with the Mission to Seafarers—pursuing their certification as ship visitors and participating in the "cyclothon" fundraiser with solid support from the parish. Most recently a crew of volunteers assisted in the packing of gift bags for seafarers in-port for the holidays. Padi tells me that a dozen from our parish joined Father Peter and his sons to do this valuable work, and I am grateful for such a strong demonstration of the parish's enduring commitment to this partnership in ministry.

As winter approached, I began to contemplate seriously the need to determine an end date for my time in New Westminster. I had opportunities to reconnect with the clergy structure and events locally, in the diocese of Olympia, and I became curious to see where I could take part more actively in diaconal ministry here in Western Washington. That led to setting a date for a concluding Sunday with St. Michael's: the Feast of All Saints

Circumstances allowed me to get across the border twice in my final months with St. Michael's. The first was a tremendous celebration of the parish anniversary and its recommitment to our partnership with the Mission to Seafarers. What a great gathering that was, especially as Archbishop Melissa was able to accompany me for that festive Sunday, September 26.

The second occasion was our celebration of All Saints on November 7, my final Sunday as deacon with the parish. The day was made special and memorable by the great—and safe--turnout of people, the preaching and celebration by Bishop Alex Wandag, the songs and dancing, and of course the wonderfully festive meal. As I sit in my office today to write these words, I look up to see the plaque that I was honoured to receive.

Thank you for my time at St. Michael's. It enriched my life and granted me bonds of love and friendship that will not be lost. My prayers are ever with you all and with the strong leadership of the parish

ANNUAL REPORT 3.1.3 - EVENING PRAYER (EP) REPORT


At the end of 2021, a six member EP writing team (pictured below) collaborated in reflecting on the 6 ½ years of Evening Prayer at St Michaels. The graph above that picture (both from the report) shows how much EP grew at SMM in those 6 ½ years, especially during COVID (2020-21).

The Executive Summary distilled the learnings from the report as follows:

After 600+ Evening Prayer (EP) Offices over 6+ years, 400+ mini-Homilies over 4+ years, and the 120 pages of this project, it is possible to distill the learnings into ten points (a good biblical number!). These are, in order of priority, <u>Testimonials</u>, Benedictine Effects, Evolutions, ZOOM (#1 & #2), Participation, <u>Workload</u>, this Project, and the Joy Kogawa House.

For Vestry, two points are worth emphasizing; Testimonials, and Workload (underlined above).

- 1. **TESTIMONIALS**: the writers pictured below all provided one-page Testimonials. Without exception, they were well informed and positive, and reinforced just how important Evening Prayer has become in the Spiritual Health and Growth of St Michael's.
- 2. **WORKLOAD**: the report did a good job of highlighting the workload required to generate such positive testimonials. And, helped emphasize that the workload was not sustainable. At the Church Council meeting on 26 Jan 2022, the committee were in agreement with several possible proposals to provide more breathing room for the leaders, and left it up to the Writing Team (below) to evolve the program over 2022 so that there is more latitude for breaks that eliminates the concern for burnout, but sustains the growth highlighted in the Testimonials.


ANNUAL REPORT 3.1.3 - EVENING PRAYER (EP) SURVEY #2 (DEC 2021)

Building on EP Survey #1 Report for the 2021 Vestry (see Appendix 2), EP Survey #2 Report is presented here for the 2022 Vestry. 6 Aug 2021 marked the 6th Anniversary of EP at SMM, and this 2nd Report looks back across the full 6+ years, highlighting below five areas: mini-Homilies, Graphics, The Old Testament, Diversity, and Post Covid.


I. MINI-HOMILIES AS A PART OF EVENING PRAYER (EP) - EP traditions in the world do not usually include messages/mini-Homilies. We wanted to be sure SMM's approach was meeting the spiritual needs of our congregation. So, for the 2nd year in a row we made it part of our Survey. The two graphs below show that satisfaction remains high (these results are expanded upon in Section I.2 of the full report at www.stmikes-church.ca).



- **II. GRAPHICS -** EP with Zoom began in April 2020, the 2nd month of COVID. Over the 18+ COVID months since, we have had two big learnings. One, attendance doubled. Two, with the capabilities of Zoom, we use Graphics much more. This has dramatically increased what we can do with our mini-Homilies, which makes the homilists job much easier. And, the graph below shows that there has been some congregational satisfaction with this new capability. This is given full treatment in Sections III.5-7 of the full report at *www.stmikes-church.ca*.
- III. THE OT IS IN THE NT REVEALED Of the 400+ mini-Homilies over the last 4+ years, probably 90%+ have been on the Old Testament, with an emphasis on the subject line above. While satisfaction with this approach wasn't 100%, a clear majority states that it makes a difference to them, as can be seen below. For the homilists, this takes away our fear that we were being a bit too theological. Section II.5 expands on this.



IV. DIVERSITY IN WORSHIP - The format of our EP Liturgy (separate & apart from the mini-Homilies), has evolved significantly over 6 ½ years, especially with the advent of Zoom in Apr 2020. This 2nd Survey shows appreciation for the diversity introduced, regarding both the inclusion of music, and variations in lay participation. The two graphs below show this. III. 9 & 10 expands upon this.



V. Post Covid The final substantive learning from Survey #2 regarded the future of EP at SMM, post COVID. Beyond a shadow of a doubt, the congregational wish to continue with a Zoom option couldn't be clearer – 100% asked for this continuance (the same as for Sundays).

CONCLUSION? Despite the demands made on the congregation (theologically & participatively), the consensus seems to be to hold the course. EP Survey # 3 in a year's time will test this assumption.

Dear Catherine, Moira & Paul

Greetings of the New Year to the three of you, and, through you, to the St. Philip's OUTREACH COMMITTEE that so generously participates in and supports the Tri-Parish Meal Ministry Program in the Mt. Pleasant area.

Our annual AVM to AVM update for you reports on the 2020 year of COVID, and a Meal Ministry program that has been absent since both our churches closed after Sunday 22 March.

- There were no Hot Meals in 2020 after that date. We were just in the process of re-opening the Food Bank when we were hit with the resurgent November COVID wave.
- You might recall we requested that you put on hold your \$200 per month submission for our Tri-Parish Meal Ministry. Anticipating a Spring of 2021 re-opening (12 months later?!), we will keep you informed through Catherine, for your consideration, whether you might be able to resume as well?

We have been busy, however, in preparing for the time when we will re-open. One of those activities has been to do a Survey, including St Philip's. You might find some of the following Survey results of interest.

- 1. **Budgeting** after increasing the budget for 2020 (the full year budget would have been \$8,440), St Michael's is facing a deficit for the first time in 15 years. Despite Meal Ministry being our foremost Ministry (after Worship, of course), St Mike's will need to reduce their commitment to this program in 2021. This will likely result in less for the monthly hot meal, and less for Turkeys at Thanksgiving. If we go down to \$400 per hot meal, the split would be equal between St Philip's & St Mike's.
- 2. **Just Right** in a typical non-COVID type year, there has been approximately 52 Meal Ministry events hosted in the Mount Pleasant area at St Michaels. Survey results were unanimous that this was just right for the Meal Ministry Team. The only change under consideration, given the Food Bank conflict with Evening Prayer on Thursdays, was to seek a consensus on an alternate time/date. Pending resolution.
- 3. **Re-opening** the Survey responses were unanimous in wanting to wait until 2021 to re-open. The Survey was done late November, when BC was well into the second wave of the pandemic, amidst the strictest of guidelines regarding gatherings, so the caution was more than understandable. Possibly in the Spring?

Looking forward to resuming our partnership once COVID is somewhat under control and we can once again be fellow servants in ministering to those less fortunate than ourselves.

ANNUAL REPORT 3.8 - MBSM



SAYING FAREWELL TO THE REV. ERIC STROO, & WELCOMING THE RIGHT REV ALEX WANDAG

ARTICLE FOR TOPIC SUBMISSION

The Rev Wilmer Toyoken began his tenure with St Michael's Multicultural (SMM) on 15 Nov 2011. On 7 & 14 Nov 2021, the congregation celebrated his 10th Anniversary at SMM. The occasion was heightened/enhanced by the confluence of two other significant events in the life of St Michaels; saying good-bye to their Deacon of 4 ½ years, and welcoming a new honorary Minister to SMM, the retired Right Reverend Alex Wandag.

I. 10 YEARS – EZRA, ROSE & PADI WILMER

The celebration of Padi Wilmer's 10 years of Ministry at St Michael's marked an auspicious date for him, his family, and St Michael's. For St Michael's, after 10 years without a dedicated priest (the last 5 of those years with Supply Clergy), the progress of the church since then is visible everywhere. In one of his early homilies, Padi emphasized Servant Leadership. Ten years later, those two words were visible on the stage, and captured unerringly the guiding culture of Padi's leadership style, and the style of the leadership team and congregation that he joined in 2011. Nourishing that culture was the source, we believe, of all else accomplished during his ten years. The second most visible manifestation of that success is the four primary ministries at St Michael's. When Padi joined SMM in 2011, there was only one – SMM's highly successful Meal Ministry. Since then he has added a robust youth/children's ministry (more on that following), a strong Anglican Communion Asian Pacific Ministry in partnership with TEC, an Evening Prayer program (6+ years), and a strong four year partnership with the Mission to Seafarers.

The Youth/Children's Ministry has been especially strong. Highlights have been 18 youth at an Anglican Communion event in Hawaii in 2019, accompanied by AB Melissa & Deacon Eric. The hard work to make this possible rests with the Toyoken family – Rose Toyoken was the organizing force behind this event, as well as the 2019 event in California. This program is guaranteed a strong future with Rose's continuing leadership and energy, as well as a \$5,000 per Grant bestowed on her program by Sam Copley (which began in 2020).

And last but not least, their son Ezra has been a fixture at Evening Prayer, and especially has been a part of the Sunday liturgy, where he rings the bell to mark the "Do this in Remembrance of me" points of the Communion service.

II. 41/2 YEARS – THE REV DEACON ERIC STROO

In addition to the Toyoken family anniversary, SMM marked the occasion of The Rev. Deacon Eric Stroo's final day at SMM. There was a half hour slide show with music, produced by People's Warden James Baldo ODNW. This especially captured Eric's penchant for dancing! In addition to being presented with a healthy supply of bubbly (how do you get that across the border, Eric?), he was presented with a plaque by the Rector's Warden, Moses Kajoba ODNW. The words on that plaque summarize nicely Eric's contributions to SMM in his 4 ½ years. They can be seen at the end of the next page.

Bishop John Stevens sent a letter to Padi Wilmer to be read out to the congregation on the occasion of his last day. He captured perfectly the sentiments of the congregation at SMM. See it following Deacon Eric's plaque on the next page.

III. THE RIGHT REVEREND BISHOP ALEX WANDAG

The preacher for the double occasion of the 10th Anniversary of Padi Wilmer and our good-bye to Deacon Eric was the Right Rev. Bishop Alex Wandag. + Alex's message was most memorable, sealed with a single clap/stomp for Padi Wilmer, and a double clap/stomp for Deacon Eric. Auspiciously, it marked the first occasion when Bishop Alex participated in an SMM service since receiving a letter from Bishop John granting him a license to officiate. The deep hole left by the departure of Deacon Eric will be felt for a long time, but it was felt that the Lord provides in wonderful ways in sending Bishop Alex to us as a sign of new beginnings. Bishop Alex faithfully accepted the endorsement of the eight SMM Wardens/Trustees, and the subsequent congregational ratification at Vestry, in becoming SMM's Honorary Minister.

As many are aware, a major Anglican Communion initiative of the Diocese of New Westminster has been a Partnership with a Cordilleran Diocese in the Philippines. Bishop Alex has recently retired from that area of the Philippines, and joins a congregation that he has visited many times over the last 15 years, where he has always been very active in the musical ministry of the church. His wife Grace has been an active member of SMM for over 15 years, and was the first leader of the ACW when it was re-established in 2012. She has been covering for the current President, Judith Carling, who has been undergoing treatment for Cancer. A primary emphasis of Deacon Eric in his final speech was a shout out to the ACW as the 'heart' of SMM.

A testimonial to Deacon Eric's observation regarding the 'heart' of SMM - Grace became a Trustee of St Michaels at the 2022 Vestry (on the same day her husband was ratified as Honorary Minister).

IV. THE THREE - BISHOP ALEX, DEACON ERIC & PADI WILMER

As indicated above, the picture of Padi Wilmer & his family can be seen on the front page of the 2022 Annual Report. Accompanying it is one of SMM's Three Wise Men.

- Redevelopment is one of the new priorities (Smart Goal) in the Strategic
 Plan which took in the old priority of handicapped access for the building.
- To act on a recommendation from the Church Committee in Nov 2020 to add Redevelopment to the Strat Plan (in the new 2028 plan)
- Was ratified at Annual Vestry Meeting 132 (see items II.3 and III.7 on pages 16 and 17 of 24 from the Closing Report – STRAT PLAN 2021 – 10page Summary document)

- II.3 " In addition to recommending a continued level of commitment to Strat Plan 2028, the Team recommends that NEW members be added to the Team, and that REDEVELOPMENT be a core part of the new Strat Plan. These two recommendations, as with all the others, are unanimous."
- III.7 "STRAT PLAN 2028 the 2021 Strat Plan Team recommends that the existing 21 SMART Goals continue to be the backbone focus of Strat Plan 2028, with one major addition. It is recommended that SMART Goal #15 be dramatically expanded to REDEVELOPMENT. The next page summarizes a +'ve Dec 17 meeting with the Diocesan Redevelopment Team. As a result of that meeting, the Strat Plan Team is recommending that Phase I (Fact Finding) begin immediately, possibly leading to Phase II (Initial Planning) after the 2022 AVM.

 The Strat Plan Team agrees with the Diocesan recommendation of a dedicated team. For Phase I in 2021, it recommends 7 members (MK,JB,BC,PB & MT, with WT & GT co-chairing)."
